Part A: Pupil premium strategy plan

Statement of intent

At St Philip's CE Primary Academy we target the use of Pupil Premium Grant funding to ensure that our disadvantaged pupils receive the highest quality of education to enable them to become active, socially responsible citizens of the future. We recognise that disadvantaged children can face a wide range of barriers which may impact on their learning.

Our ultimate objectives are to:

- Remove barriers to learning created by poverty, family circumstance and back-ground
- Narrow the attainment gaps between disadvantaged pupils and their non-disadvantaged counterparts both within school and nationally
- Ensure ALL pupils are able to read fluently and with good understanding to enable them to access the breadth of the curriculum
- Develop confidence in their ability to communicate effectively in a wide range of contexts
- Enable pupils to look after their social and emotional wellbeing and to develop resilience.
- Access a wide range of opportunities to develop their knowledge and understanding of the world

Our context:

- IDACI Decile 1.7 indicates the Academy is in the highest 10% level of deprivation.
- 30% of pupils are eligible for Pupil Premium Funding in comparison to 23% national.

Achieving our objectives:

- In order to achieve our objectives and overcome identified barriers to learning we will:
- Provide all teachers with high quality CPD to ensure that pupils access effective quality first teaching
- Provide targeted intervention and support to quickly address identified gaps in learning including the use of small group work, 1:1 tuition
- Target funding to ensure that all pupils have access to trips, residential, firsthand learning experiences
- Provide appropriate nurture support to enable pupils to access learning within and beyond the classroom.

Key Principals:

We will ensure that effective teaching, learning and assessment meets the needs of all pupils through the rigorous analysis of data. Class teachers will identify through the class pupil premium plan specific intervention and support for individual pupils which will be reviewed at least termly. Alongside academic support, we will ensure that those pupils who have social, emotional and mental health needs will access high quality provision from appropriately trained adults

Challenges

This details the key challenges to achievement that we have identified among our disadvantaged pupils.

Challenge number	Detail of challenge
1	Pupil Premium children have been tracked rigorously across school but there is an inconsistent picture of progress and attainment for this groups of pupils across year groups and subjects.
2	90% pupils have English as an additional language. Home language is also very limited in the majority of households – illiterate in both home language and English when entering school.
3	Area in which the academy is situated has a high level of deprivation and high levels of crime, in particular serious violence, drugs, gangs and domestic violence.
4	Attendance is an issue due to extended visits to Pakistan and a small number of pupils with Persistent Absence due to home issues, social/emotional needs or cultural difference. This is having particular negative impact for Pupil Premium students, which in-turn is having a detrimental effect on their progress and attainment.
5	The Girington Ward has very high incidents of poor health (See Government health data 2018/19)
6	The global pandemic has had a detrimental effect on our pupils' writing and speaking and listening skills. This was due to not having daily examples of standard English during lockdown, where almost all of our pupils missed 6 months of their education. Further lockdown also impacted

Pupil premium strategy outcomes

Due to COVID-19, performance measures have not been published for 2020 to 2021, and 2020 to 2021 results will not be used to hold schools to account.

Key areas of impact

- 2020 Autumn Term Phonics screening test results 88% all pupils, 100% PPpupils achieved the pass mark.
- 2021 Year 1 Phonics screening teacher assessment PP children: 90% predicted Autumn 2022. Currently 75% on track for all pupils. 100% achieved the pass mark for the PSC - TA assessed June 2021
- PP attendance figures for end of 2020-2021: 96.2% Above national
- Teacher assessed end of KS2 results continue to improve and remain in-line with national
